Assumptions and whispers were never far from her presence.

An oppressive regime that ruled by terror ordered an arduous third trimester journey that ended with no guest room available.

Your first-time mother endured labor and delivery with livestock instead of a midwife.

Was there a moment where angelic promises felt too good to be true? AllWas there a moment where faith felt foolish?

Leader We light this second candle as an act of faith even as we wrestle with doubt.

Light the candle of Faith along with the Hope candle together.

It couldn't have been easy to walk by faith uphill, in a rainy season of cold nights. It couldn't have been easy to walk by faith dozens of miles just to feel forgotten and cast aside.

Give us the grace to join your earthly parents when our own journeys are hard. AllGive us the strength to put one foot in front of another.

Give us confidence in what we hope for.

Give us assurance in what we don't yet see.

We believe. Please help our unbelief. Amen.

Community Group Questions

- 1) Peter lays out three contrasts in 1 Peter 5:2-3 for how elders are to oversee the flock: "not like this..." he says, "but like this..." What does it look like when elders live this out, when they do the positive side of each of those contrasts?
- 2) Read Mark 10:35–45. How is your heart and desire like James' and John's? How does Jesus serve not just as example for a different way but the means and power for that different way?
- 3) Why do you think Peter includes instructions to leaders—who make up a specific, probably small, sub-group—in a letter to be read to the entire church? What does the whole church need to hear from these verses? What do you personally need to hear?
- 4) It is always hard to humble ourselves toward one another, and living in a divisive season under a pandemic does not make it any easier. How do you struggle with humbling yourself toward other Christians? What about with Christians you know you disagree with? What grace does 1 Peter 5:1–5 offer to enable you to obey the commands of verse 5?

Children's Questions

When Peter talks to Christians "who are younger," he means everyone in the church in general, which certainly includes you who really are younger! What are the right ways to submit to the church's elders? What are the wrong ways? How is it good for you to be part of a church led by elders? How do they point you to trust in Jesus as the chief Shepherd?
