Advent Procession

In our Advent procession, elements of past liturgical artworks from this season are carried in each week. These common items—such as yarn and string—help us remember Advents past, even as we continue to wait. These elements remind us of the many ways God has been part of every Advent season at Redeemer.

Window Covering

The window is a map of rebuilding: the rings represent us, our families, tribes, workplaces, neighborhoods, and the city. The metallic pipecleaners represent our interconnections, creating a beautiful pattern of God's grace and mercy reaching far beyond our individual selves.

Towers represent the corners of the rebuilt temple, constructed during Ezra's time. Golden bowls, part of the treasure provided to build the temple, define the structures. Yet, as the church calendar progresses, they also become monumental Advent candles, signalling our anticipation of Jesus, savior of the world.

The places we are from carry a feeling, a texture. The familiarity of a handrail or a rocking chair, a tile floor, a crack in the sidewalk can take us back in time, give us a sense of place, or keep us grounded. The descendants of Hobaiah, Hakkoz and Barzillai (a man who had married a daughter of Barzillai the Gileadite and was called by that name). These searched for their family records, but they could not find them and so were excluded from the priesthood as unclean. The governor ordered them not to eat any of the most sacred food until there was a priest ministering with the Urim and Thummim.

Community Group Questions

- 1. How did you experience seeing and hearing the names of Ezra 2 as they were read? In what ways might the Lord be using this list of strange names and strange places to turn our hearts to consider the usefulness of scripture (cf. 2 Tim 3:15-17)?
- 2. The people of Ezra 2 were on the move because they have been moved ... their hearts had been moved to go up and build the house of the Lord in Jerusalem (1:5). How might the Lord be moving your hearts in this season to go and rebuild? Take some time as a group to share ways the Lord is moving your hearts to rebuild in areas such as relationship, career, family, reconciliation, faith, etc.
- 3. Ultimately, the question to ponder from this text is why does the author take the time to list these names? He could have simply said, "... and they went back," but he doesn't. Does this list have more to do with these people, or does it have more to do with God? Or both? Imagine what it would be like if you saw your family name on that list. How would you feel? Might there be a place in scripture where your own name is on a list like this? (cf. Phil 4:3; Rev 3:5; 13:8; 21:27.) If so, why is it there, how does this make you feel, and how does this speak to those hardest seasons of life?

Call to Communion

Guidelines for the Reception of Communion

Redeemer welcomes to Communion all Christians who are willing to forsake their sin and trust in Jesus Christ for salvation and who are members of congregations which proclaim the gospel. We will be coming forward for the distribution of Communion. Please use the hand sanitizer. You will receive the bread into your hands and take a cup from the tray. Clear cups (located in the interior rings) contain grape juice. Red cups (exterior ring of tray) contain wine. Wait to eat the bread and drink the wine until we all do so together, once we are back in our seats. Children who have been interviewed by the elders are able to share in Communion.

Communion is a time of connection with the Lord Jesus and with each other. Feel free to sing with the band during Communion. The ministry of prayer is also a way we live together as a community of believers and seekers. Please take the time to pray on your own, or with someone else in the pews.
