Advent Reading

based on 1 Corinthians 15:35-57

Reader Someone may ask, "How will the dead be raised? What kind of bodies will they have?" What a foolish question! When you put a seed into the ground, it doesn't grow into a plant unless it dies first. And what you put in the ground is not the plant that will grow, but only a bare seed of wheat or whatever you are planting. Then God gives it the new body he wants it to have. A different plant grows from each kind of seed. Similarly there are different kinds of flesh—one kind for humans, another for animals, another for birds, and another for fish.

> It is the same way with the resurrection of the dead. Our earthly bodies are planted in the ground when we die, but they will be raised to live forever. Our bodies are buried in brokenness, but they will be raised in glory. They are buried in weakness, but they will be raised in strength. They are buried as natural human bodies, but they will be raised as spiritual bodies. For just as there are natural bodies, there are also spiritual bodies.

The Scriptures tell us, "The first man, Adam, became a living person." But the last Adam—that is, Christ—is a life-giving Spirit. What comes first is the natural body, then the spiritual body comes later. Adam, the first man, was made from the dust of the earth, while Christ, the second man, came from heaven. Earthly people are like the earthly man, and heavenly people are like the heavenly man. Just as we are now like the earthly man, we will someday be like the heavenly man.

What I am saying, dear brothers and sisters, is that our physical bodies cannot inherit the Kingdom of God. These dying bodies cannot inherit what will last forever.

For when the trumpet sounds, those who have died will be raised to live forever. And we who are living will also be transformed. For our dying bodies must be transformed into bodies that will never die; our mortal bodies must be transformed into immortal bodies.
	Then, when our dying bodies have been transformed into bodies that will never die, this Scripture will be fulfilled:
All	"Death is swallowed up in victory. O death, where is your victory? O death, where is your sting?"
Leader	Let us give profound thanks to God! For he gives us victory over sin and death through our Lord Jesus Christ.

So Moses finished the work.

Community Group Questions

1) The entire book of Exodus is driving to answer one big question: "Will God really be with us?" The answer that we get from this passage is that, yes, God is with us. How might we respond to this positively? Why? How might we respond to the negatively? Why? What keeps us from wanting the presence of God, questioning the presence of God, or perhaps not even giving a rip about it at all?

2) Read vv. 36-38. Consider what it must have been like to follow God in those days. Why might the people have liked this process? Why might the people have not liked this process? In what ways can you relate the process of following God in those days to how we follow God today?

3) The cloud of the Lord was in sight of all the house of Israel throughout all their journeys. What are the best ways that you manage to keep God's glory in sight both individually and corporately throughout all your journeys? Why might you want to/need to do this?

4) Perhaps the most effective means of motivation for us to keep God's glory in sight is found in how God ultimately answers the cliffhanger conundrum seen in v. 35. How do we remind ourselves of this answer and why is this wonderful motivation?

Children's Questions:

1) What did the cloud being with the people have to do with the glory of the Lord?

2) Imagine what it would have been like to see the cloud covering the tent of meeting. Describe how you would have felt if you had been there, knowing that God was there!

3) Now, grab a piece of paper and draw a picture of the glory of the Lord. After you are done, bring your picture back to the large group and explain to them what you have drawn and why you have drawn it that way. Then, tell the adults in the group why it was so good for the Lord to be with the people then and why it's so good for the Lord to be with us today.

Call to Communion and Prayer

Guidelines for the Reception of Communion

Redeemer welcomes all Christians who are willing to forsake their sin and trust in Jesus Christ for salvation and who are members of congregations which proclaim the gospel to receive Communion with us. We will be coming forward for the distribution of Communion. Please eat the bread privately, and then drink the cup together with us after everyone has returned to their seats. Clear cups (located in the interior rings) contain grape juice. Red cups (exterior ring of tray) contain wine. Children who have been interviewed by the elders are able to partake of Communion.

The ministry of prayer is one of the ways we live together as a community of believers and seekers. During Communion, members of our prayer team are available at the front of the sanctuary. It would be our privilege to pray with you as we walk together through the joys and struggles of life. We also encourage you to pray with one another in the pews during this time of movement in our service.

Prayer of Belief and Repentance: Jesus, I believe that you are who you say you are: the Son of God and the savior of broken people like me. I need forgiveness. I need to be made new and to start over again. I now turn away from all I have been doing. I turn away from my self-centered life. I turn my whole heart toward you. I believe that when you were crucified, you took all of my evil and somehow you gave me all of your beauty. I invite your Holy Spirit to live in me. I do not want to live for myself any more. I want you to lead my life. I want to know you and to receive your love for me. Please teach me and protect me and guide me. I am yours. I ask these things in the name of Jesus. Amen.

Prayer of Doubt and Faith: God, I don't really believe all of this, but there is a part of my heart that knows there is truth and goodness here. I am confused by the fact that there are so many things that I don't understand or that make me angry about you. There are also so many things that fill my heart with hope and many things that draw me to you, and I want to put my trust in you. God, you say I can come to you and ask for anything, so if you are real, please give me the faith I need to believe. Give me the desire to continue to seek after you. Keep my heart from self-deception. Protect me from any evil misleading or binding spirits. Calm my fears. Soften my cynicism. Be patient with me, and if you are God, please don't let me go, but instead let me know that you are real. I have a little faith, help me in my doubt.


